

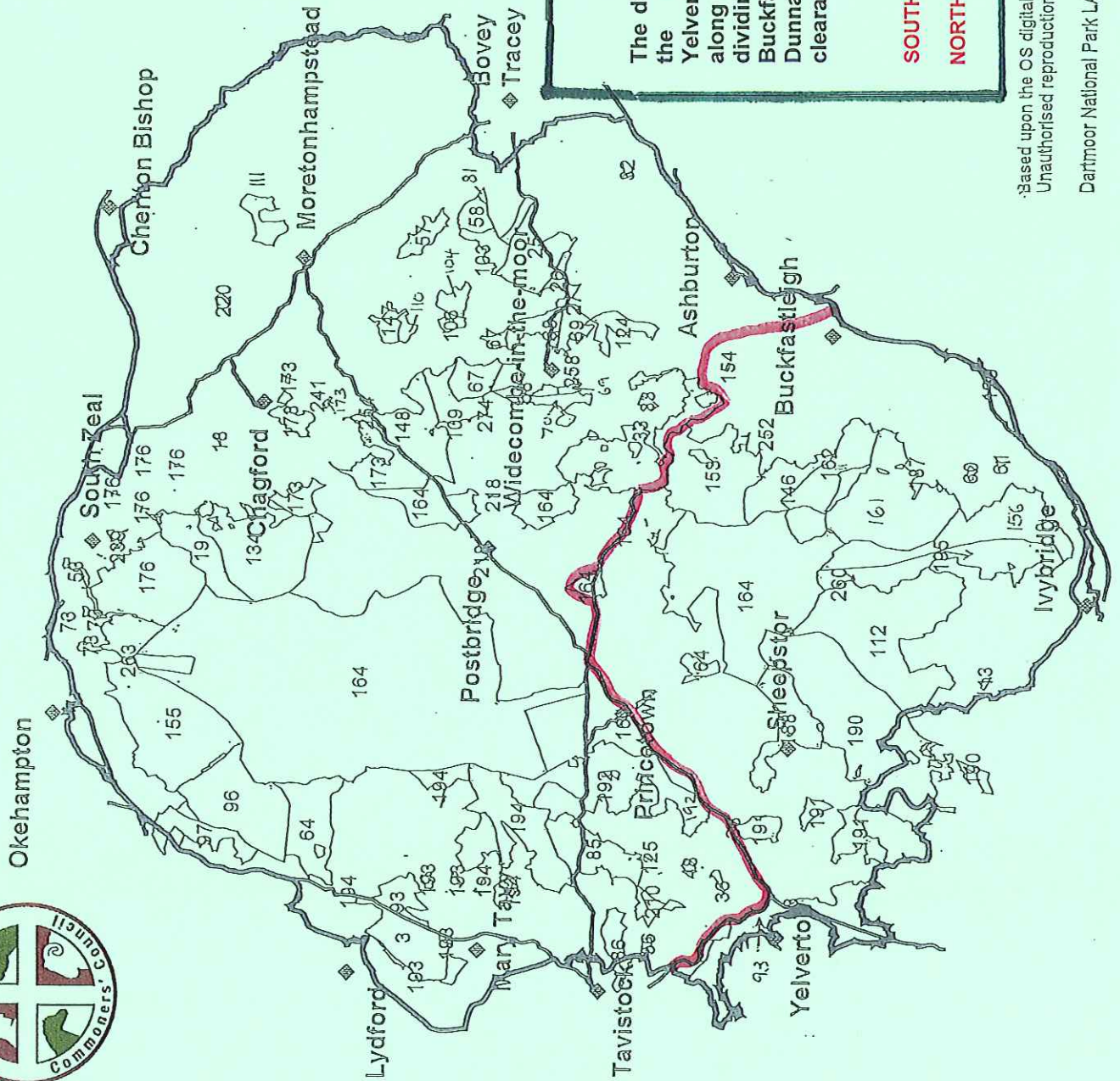
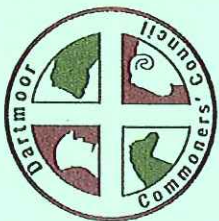

DARTMOOR COMMONS – SHEEP PROHIBITION PERIOD



NORTH/SOUTH BOUNDARY

The dividing line between the North and South areas of the moor will run along the road from Yelverton/Princetown/Two Bridges (B3312), turning right along the road to Dartmeet (B3357); thereafter the dividing line will run along the River Dart to Buckfastleigh. The whole of Roborough and Dunnabridge commons will be included in the South clearance.

SOUTH moor clear period from 9 November to 23 November

NORTH moor clear period from 16 November to 30 November
